
CHURCH? PART 2

From last month we saw that Jesus is building His church and nothing or no one can stop it, His followers are called living stones are built into the dwelling place of God.

But what does church mean?

I am sure you are aware that the New Testament was not written in English but in Greek, and the word for church is Ekklesia, which simply means to call out, in the times in which the New Testament was written this word Ekklesia was used to call out people to gather together for discussion and decision making, so the word church means a group of people called out to meet together with a common purpose or cause.

In fact, the word is not always translated church it is sometimes translated as assembly or congregation.

But you might think is the word church found in the Old Testament and if we look at the Septuagint the Greek version of the Old Testament, we do in fact find the word Ekklesia, used for example in Psalm 22:22 where the word assembly or congregation is used in the English version, the word Ekklesia is found over 50 times in the Old Testament.

So, we need, if possible, to get away from the bricks and motor, the church is those who assemble, those who form a congregation, those who are called out to meet together.


Acts 7:38 (NKJV)

"This is he who was in the congregation in the wilderness with the Angel who spoke to him on Mount Sinai, and with our fathers, the one who received the living oracles to give to us,

You've guessed it the word congregation is Ekklesia, church, so you could say "the church in the wilderness" so the idea of the church being people is not new, it has always meant a group of people, in fact it was not until the 3rd Century that Christians began to meet in buildings.

The only buildings you will find in the New Testament is when they met in each other houses for Bible study, prayer and sharing the communion.

Over the last few weeks in our online house group we have been looking at the book of Habakkuk.

This is a summery of our studies.

Why study Habakkuk?

As this quote says, "Most people, even in the Bible, who have longed for the privilege of arguing with God, of questioning the way he does things, of seeking God's explanation of his ways, have not been given that opportunity.... What Habakkuk has recorded here is something rather extraordinary: a dialogue in which he twice complains to God about the world's injustice, and twice God answers him."

If we ask over and over again, "How long, O Lord? How long?" "Why? O Why?" and as long as these questions continue to plague us, the need for Habakkuk's message is a must study.

This book not only answers to the questions we have about our world and yes we can apply it to our present situation concerning the virus.

In this book we can also gain answers to other questions that cause concern for Christians.

The problem of squaring the goodness and justice of God with the presence of what seems like unbridled evil and wickedness among men and nations. Other passages in the Bible tackle this problem, but few come to as clear a resolution of many aspects of the problem as Habakkuk does.

So what do we do when everything seems lost, hopeless, where is God in all this, again this book contains answers.

Habakkuk teaches us how to rejoice when the lid has blown off everything and nothing that we once counted on as a reference point remains fixed: everything is gone, including the food that we once, took for granted. "What we will do then?" asks Habakkuk. He although anxious, fearful of what was going to happen to God's people still had peace.

He knew what was coming but still had faith, trust in His God.

He had a peace in his heart that passed all understanding. How he maintained a sense of peace in the face of such savagery, brutality and shocking demolition of everything he had held dear (not to mention everything that God had built up through the nation of Israel over the last millennia and a half) is a lesson worth learning in our own day.

And so as we look into this book we will see how to live by faith in a God who is alive and active in the current affairs of life, distasteful and unappealing as those affairs seem at times, and to have hope, confidence in the future because of who God is.

So with all that is currently happening in our country and in the world, look at the six words that Habakkuk used to describe the world in his day, : "violence," "injustice," "wrong," "destruction," "strife" and "conflict." The times were not good at all! Therefore it was that the prophet continually lifted his prayer to God that something would be done about the unbearable amount of wrong he was experiencing
